As a result, Peace is offering more varied worship opportunities this year. Each Sunday, the 8:30 service is a more traditional liturgy with the lighting of the Advent wreath and sung responses as we celebrate Holy Communion. The 10:30 service is more "sensory rich" with a darkened sanctuary at the beginning of the service, meditation, dance, visuals, and eclectic music. In addition, there are forums about what we consider "sacred" and a Thursday evening quiet, sacred time (via zoom). You'll find additional opportunities for community service, and community-building events where we can pause and connect with each other during this holiday season. Marsha McFee put it this way: "Imagine your favorite time of the day, and let it play through your mind in slow motion. Now imagine a sprinkling of sparkling dust floating down upon this scene. All of life reflects the sacred. That's what this season and the incarnation of the Divine means." We hope you'll find something here at Peace that helps you reflect upon the sacred in your life this holy season.


CHRISTMAS EVE VIGIL 12:00 Noon City Hall Steps

Holy Cow Survey

Early in the fall, the Transition Team urged Peace members and friends to fill out a survey from Holy Cow Consulting. Holy Cow provides assessments to congregations, libraries, schools and non-profits as they navigate organizational

transitions. They have worked with more than 5,000 organizations, and so are able to also offer comparative information.

In early November, Peace staff, Co-ordinating Council members, the Transition and Search Committees and Stewardship Team were invited to a presentation of the survey results.

On December 4, the Transition Team made two presentations to the congregation, one at the 9:30 forum time and one immediately following the 10:30 worship. The second was livestreamed and is still available to view: (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=bvoer2gyKBw)

According to the survey, most of the congregation are satisfied and feel positively about Peace. However, the sources of that satisfaction and energy differ among members of the congregation. The data is broken down by both length of tenure at Peace and age ranges, so there is some sense of what is important to whom.

Despite the differences among congregants, Holy Cow identified four top goals widely supported by Peace:

Develop and implement a comprehensive strategy to reach new people and incorporate them into the life of the church.

Make necessary changes to attract families with children and youth to our church.

Create more opportunities for people to form meaningful relationships (for example, small groups, nurtured friendships, shared meals, etc).

Develop ministries that work toward healing those broken by life circumstances.

These priorities are already guiding staff and Coordinating Council decisions.

Holy Cow identified three goals that are more strongly supported at Peace than in many other congregations.

Expand outreach ministries that provide direct services to those living on the margins of society. (i.e. homeless, immigrant, transient persons)

Strengthen the management and support of persons in various ministries so that they are able to do what they do best in work that is meaningful and celebrated

Strengthen the pastoral response of the church in serving people in times of need (emotional, mental, physical, spiritual, etc.).

These goals may provide important clues about areas of ministry to be strengthened as we move into the future.

Two other insights may be helpful in understanding who we are a congregation. Holy Cow consultants characterized the culture of Peace Church as what they call "magi culture." This includes a desire for the mystical, intellectual curiosity, valuing different perspectives, and a willingness to explore possibilities. They also characterized Peace church as a "pastor-centered" congregation, meaning that the identified leader has an important role in shaping the life of the congregation and making decisions.

I want to share some exciting news about a UCC leadership program to which I was recently accepted. The program is called the Next Generation Leadership

Initiative (NGLI) and is sponsored by the UCC Pension Boards. They describe it as a "leadership development initiative that equips, energizes, and empowers younger UCC local church pastors to build vibrant congregations that change lives and further God's mission in the world."

I share not only because I am personally excited about being selected as one of 14 young congregational leaders from around the country, but because it benefits you as a congregation by increasing my leadership capacity and knowledge.

While I am just beginning this 6 year program (which includes 2 week-long continuing education experiences each year), I want to share a couple highlights from my recent trip to Memphis for the orientation. During our 5 days there, we had conversations about the future of the church. We visited the Civil Rights Museum at the Lorraine motel. Together we reflected how racial justice and building the beloved community must be central in our vision of the future. We took some initial steps toward building trust and having honest conversations with each other.

We also were introduced to the Whole Brain Thinking Model which helps organize and define cognitive diversity in different kinds of people. For example, while everyone has the ability to think in the four ways the model puts forward, some people have particular tendencies. Some people are more drawn to facts and ask how what we are doing moves us toward our goal. Others are focused on relationships and ask who is at the table in our work together. Still others focus on vision and creativity and will continually ask "what if ...?" Others will tend to focus on the details and ask how we will organize to get something done. There is no "best" way of thinking—we need all kinds of people to help make things happen in community. While all models like this have their limitations, I find it helpful to reflect on making sure the work that I do either includes multiple ways of thinking or best matches the person with whom I am working. I appreciate your support in giving me space to grow as a leader. I am excited to offer my learning as I work here.

Peace Staff Under Construction

Peace Church staff continues to undergo transitions. Pastor Jim accepted a call to the Congregational Church of Belmont, California. He will serve as their settled pastor and will be able to live in his own apartment. He has lived in the area for many years, it is "home" to him.

He, the Executive Committee at Peace, and the Minnesota Conference staff are working to secure a Bridge Minister for Peace. The work of a Bridge Pastor is a little different from that of an Interim Minister. Their job is to provide leadership as the congregation readies itself for a settled pastor. They do not plan to stay as long nor do they initiate as many changes as an Interim. Here a Bridge Pastor will likely have primary responsibility for preaching, working with the Coordinating Council, and supervising staff. Much of the ongoing ministry of the congregation will continue to be carried out by the current staff.

Peace is currently without the anticipated business manager and the office coordinator, Bri Dornbush, is expected to return from maternity leave at the end of December. Susan Richards is serving as a temporary office assistant in Bri's absence.

There are some new developments in conversations about a staff position to augment Nathan's work with children and youth. More than a year ago, Peace's Children's Minister resigned. For the last year, that position was not filled. In the meantime, Nathan has worked with Peace parents, the teams related to Faith Formation and Children's Ministry, and other staff. Another model for staffing Children, Youth, and Family Ministries is emerging. The Faith Formation Minister oversees faith development programs across the generations. We have hired an additional part-time person (more info coming next month with a full introduction) who will help implement some specific programs such as Children's Church and/or youth group activities.

Charlotte continues to fill in where needed, currently she is helping with much of the of administrative support during this transition time.

The staff appreciates your support and encouragement in this time of change.






