## **Renewal of Baptism**

In the church year and in the lectionary, Jesus' birth stories are followed immediately by the story of his baptism in the River Jordan. Across the wide expanse of Christian theology and practice, this is widely regarded as his initiation into his life's work of healing, teaching, and saving humankind. From very early in Christian church history, the Sacrament of Baptism is also regarded as the rite of initiation into Christian life and community. It marks the beginning of a believer's journey in discipleship and participation in the life of a community of disciples.

On January 9, we will celebrate Renewal of Baptism for the congregation at both services. While baptism is usually considered a "one time event," many congregations observe this liturgy of remembrance and renewal of baptism. For infants or children, baptism represents initiation into the faith of their parents, who are involved in the ceremony along with other witnesses (Godparents) who promise to raise their child in our Christian tradition.

When baptized children reach adolescence, the church provides the opportunity for them to reflect on this faith into which they were baptized and confirm it for themselves. This is the rite of confirmation.

For adults, baptism signals an adult confirmation of their spiritual path here at Peace Church and in the broader Christian faith as a fellow journeyer with Jesus. If you would like to have someone in your family baptized during the 10:30 service on January 9, please contact pastorjim@peaceucc.org and/or speak to him at church. The adult form on January 2 will focus on baptism and serve as preparation for baptism and baptismal renewal on January 9.

The word covenant is used in our denomination to signify both our individual and collective relationship to God and to each other. On January 30, the date of our annual meeting as a congregation, Pastor Charlotte will reflect on the meaning of covenant, the bond that ties together those followers of Jesus who have been baptized and agree to travel the journey of Christian faith together. Membership in a congregation is an agreement to be in covenant with God as made known in Jesus and in covenant with each other. The adult forum that morning will explore the meaning of covenant and, at the 10:30 service, there will be an opportunity for individuals or families to join Peace's covenant. At the end of this year when our covenantal bonds with each other have been frayed by covid and circumstance, we will also offer a liturgy of membership renewal for all of us.

January 23: Searching Together: Roe vs. Wade—The United Church of Christ is a "prayerfully pro-choice" denomination. What does our faith say about the issue of abortion?

January 30: Our Common Connection:
Covenant—What does it mean to "belong" to a congregation? Or for our congregation to "belong" to the United Church of Christ? We are bound together by covenant. Come, help us talk about what that means.

## Covid-19 Building Policy Update

## **Updates To Our Covid-19 Policies**

Peace Church is committed to protecting the health and safety of our community and its members. To this end, we are committed to providing a variety of ways for persons to participate in our life as a congregation. Whether you choose to participate in person or on line, we welcome you!

- 1. For those who choose to participate in church activities in person, we expect all persons eligible to be vaccinated.
- 2. Masking is required at all times in the building in any public spaces. Masks are to cover both nose and mouth except those who are leading worship from the front of the church.
- 3. Peace committee meetings can take place in person, by zoom or a combo. If a meeting takes place inperson at church, masking and social distancing are required. Members of the committee may bring in their own beverages to drink, as long as they retain masks except for when they are drinking.
- 4. Singing will be allowed during services since all are fully masked. Those attending should be aware of social distancing and, if possible, avoid sitting directly behind others. Choir will be masked, but a soloist will be unmasked when singing from the choir loft. A wind instrument player may also be unmasked when playing.
- 5. Wednesday evening meals are still on hold at this time. This will allow for more space for Wednesday night programming and reduced risk of transmission with indoor eating.
- 6. Food and drink are limited. Coffee hours may be held and tables may be set up in fellowship hall. People may lift their masks briefly to drink beverages. Masks should remain in place for socializing. Food may not be eaten yet; however, individually wrapped food can be handed to people. Staff may eat their lunch in the office. The day care will continue to use their own guidelines for food and beverage inside their rented space.
- 7. No overnight groups are allowed in the building at this time.
- 8. There are no occupancy limits in the Fellowship Hall or other meeting rooms as long as air filtration devices are used according to the space.
- 9. There is no occupancy limit in the Sanctuary or narthex but masking and social distancing are required. Adequate air filtration is required either from the master unit or by fan air filtration devices.
- 10. Offering plates and pew pads can now be passed in worship.
- 11. Everyone should assess their own comfort level about church gatherings. Peace will make strong effort to provide streaming or zoom technology for services and some meetings.

## Nathan's Column

Epiphany is the season of light. Light has so many different layers of meaning—I think of how actual sunlight brings us life, how we could not exist here without the sun. Because of our commitment here at Peace to justice, I think of light as the source

In January, we'll focus on a racial justice theme leading up to MLK Day and then start to brainstorm what our youth want in youth group together moving forward into the winter/spring. Come join us—youth group is the place where we cultivate community and a sense of belonging—it's awesome!

of power in our movement toward environmental justice, toward sustainable energy and solar power (and I am grateful locally to Solar United Neighbors who are creating solar cooperatives and funding solar for low income folks, as many of you saw and commented on the recent news article I was in). But being a church, a place of spiritual growth and meaning, I also think of how powerful light is in our faith and spiritual lives.

I love how Steven Charleston, an incredible Indigenous Christian elder, shares about light in his book "Ladder to the Light." He begins by explaining the significance of the Southwest Indigenous tradition of the kiva. The kiva is a square or circular underground chamber, covered by a roof of wooden beams with an opening in the center. It is a place of darkness, a womb of darkness that holds life—as he describes it, and the only way out is to ascend the ladder to the light. It is a journey that is not afraid of darkness—both the kind that nurtures us and the kind that touches our fears and struggles. In other words, the spiritual journey that Charleston invites us to is one that gets real with how hard things can be in this life, while also reaching toward a vision of real hope that sustains us. In his writing, he often makes reference to his people, his ancestors who walked the trail of tears, an Indigenous death march that many of us know from our history. He and his people have known struggle, have known a deep kind of darkness. But because of this, his reference to his people's hope—their insistence on the light of their vision, their deep resilience—gives a deeper context to his invitation to all of us to become a shining people filled with the light of hope.

With all this context, I invite you to experience a passage from Charleston's book, to receive the blessing and the invitation of light:

#### The Light is Coming

Now the light is coming, running like liquid beneath the heavy shadows of night, slipping in from the cracks and crevices of life, restoring the dry and empty places, bringing new life to the barren hope of years long past. Soon the brightness cannot be contained, but spills out, pours out, to surround your heart with love, to bring you alive once more in an old promise fulfilled. Open your eyes and do not be afraid any longer, for now the light is coming—coming quickly, coming to you—and nothing, not even death, will be able to stop it.

This Epiphany season, I hope we all can open our eyes in a new way, allowing our fears to be dissolved by the light that is coming. May we find a way to look up (from all that keeps us down) to see the light that cannot be contained.

The Tech team is gearing up to continue to livestream one service each Sunday.

Acting for Justice team, The November team meeting covered a lot of ground. Year end allocations for local and denominational ministries were reported. A "Circle of Support" for Afghan Immigrants is being formed. Peace Church will be one of a number of congregations or organizations to support Afghani displaced by the end of the war. The Council passed a resolution to support the Afghan Refugee Resettlement Program to include a clearing account for funding the effort. The Team also brought the need for support for the Steve O'Neil Apartments families and encouraged the Council to actively engage with the Steve O'Neil Apartment owners/managers.

The council will conduct a planning retreat on Saturday, January 22, 2022.

Peace Church has the opportunity to apply for a Clergy Care grant through the conference. The grants are used to provide small amounts of funding to ministers for opportunities to take a break from their work.

A Holiday and year-end appeal to provide gifts of appreciation to staff was announced.

Susan Larson Kidd puts in many hours prepping for Sunday services so we can have quality livestreaming. Thank you!

The Council acknowledged and accepted the resignation from the Council of Doug Bowen-Bailey effective December 14. The Council expressed its gratitude for the many years of service that the Bowen-Baileys provided to Peace Church.

The Council set future meetings including a budget review session on December 20, its regular business meeting on January 18, and a congregational meeting [to adopt the 2022 budget] on January 30.

I wish you all the happiest of holiday seasons. I invite everyone to make space in your new year for reengaging or continued participation in the life of the church. There is an abundance of opportunities to connect and contribute. Now more than at any time in my 40+ years as a member at Peace Church has the church needed everyone to get involved. I look forward to

## **Afghan Resettlement Update**

Peace's Immigrant Welcoming Team is preparing to apply to help resettle Afghan new-comers. Generally speaking, refugees or those eligible for refugee status are settled through not for profit agencies with help from congregations or other groups. Because the number of Afghan newcomers exceeds the capacity of such agencies, an alternative route to resettlement has been developed. Peace Church's Immigrant Welcoming Team will submit an application to resettle 1-4 Afghan newcomers through this alternative process.

The goal of resettlement is to assist newcomers to become independent as quickly as possible. They receive work permits quickly and are eligible for some supportive benefits. Financial support from a resettling organization is limited to the first few months.

This effort is being led by Terrie and Lyle Shannon, Mollie Stapleton Clark, Gayle and Jack Kelly, Gary Boelhower, and Penny Cragun. They and Pastor Charlotte Frantz have been in contact with other groups in Duluth that are also considering possible ways to assist in resettlement.

Donations for resettlement can be made to Peace Church and marked Afghan Resettlement. Electronic gifts can be accepted through Peace's website. Part of the application process is demonstrating knowledge about community resources related to resettlement needs: employment, orientation to the community, language services, housing, etc. If you have information you think would be helpful, please email Terrie Shannon (tshannon@d.umn.edu)

## The CHUM Warming Center Needs Your Help!

The Warming Center is a safe, nighttime space for people who are experiencing homelessness or stranded during Duluth's cold winter months. As many as 100 people will check in to the Warming Center every night, some just to warm up and some to spend the entire night.

The Warming Center is located at the Rainbow Center downtown but will be moving to a permanent location in Lincoln Park in January. It is a collaboration between CHUM, Loaves & Fishes, the City of Duluth, St Louis County, and the Duluth HRA. We rely on a generous community of volunteers and donors to stay open to those in need.

At least two volunteers are needed every evening and every morning for a variety of duties including cleaning up, setting up, serving coffee, and distributing clothing and hygiene supplies. Volunteer shifts are generally 2 - 2.5 hours.


