#### From the Moderator

Greetings from the Coordinating Council! Our next meeting will be held February 20<sup>th</sup> at 6:30pm, and we welcome guests. Attending a council meeting is a great way to learn more about the nuts and bolts of our church. In a few short months we will begin the process of seeking new council candidates for the coming council year (July - June). Please consider if this might be right for you.

On January 16<sup>th</sup>, we welcomed Pastor Corinne to her first council meeting here at Peace. Melissa Boyle made soup, Joan Peterson brought chocolate, and some of us were able to come early and enjoy a meal together. The meeting included a review of our 2024 budget, including our 2023 finances, which ended with a small positive balance. Thank you all for your help in making that happen! On January 28th, the voting quorum representing the congregation approved our 2024 working budget of \$684,253 during the annual budget meeting. Our projected income is \$626,645 and we will be working with the stewardship team to close that gap throughout the coming year. Many thanks to those who have made financial commitments to support Peace in 2024! It's exciting to be a part of this work with you. In addition to reviewing the budget, we also received the reports from committees and teams and spent some time discussing the Stepping On Up project which is included on page 8. We hope to welcome unhoused young adults into a renovated space this fall.

# In the heart of fear and pain, God plants the seed of our joy.



Lent can be a somber season of the church year. It begins with an ashen sign of mortality. Bright colors turn to deep purples and alleluias fall silent. Though the word Lent derives from an Old English word for *springtime*, spring still

seems far off here in Duluth. Easter, on the other hand, is obviously joyful. Bells ring, alleluias echo, white and gold shine brightly, and every single candle is lit. Jesus is risen, and so are the daffodils, hyacinths, and lilies. Joy clearly belongs to Easter.

But a joyful Lent is not an oxymoron. As it turns out, joy is right at home during a minor-key season like Lent – and if joy is there, perhaps there are other seasons of life that joy calls home, too. Joy is a beacon that points us toward God's unfailing presence, even in the heart of fear and pain.

This Lent, we will explore joy through the theme *Seeds of Joy*, using materials from Barn Geese Worship.

In 2014 Alice Wong created the Disability Visibility Project to bring awareness to the over 61 million people living in the United States who live with some kind of disability. The aim was to collect oral stories of people in order to preserve their experience living in a world designed for able bodied people. In 2020 Wong put together the anthology *Disability Visibility: First Person Stories from the Twenty-First Century.* In it she includes congressional testimonies, blog posts, eulogies, and so much more. *Disability Visibility* is an incredibly important piece of history, and we invite you to read and discuss it with us.

# **Climate Corner**

"What's with this weird weather?" - Anonymous UMD student

Yale University's Program on Climate Change Communication lays out five climate change basics:

- It's real.
- It's us.
- It's bad.
- Scientists agree.
- There's hope.

Faith communities are uniquely positioned to talk about societal issues - justice, nature, rights, love, connections...

So, let's talk climate! The more that talking about climate change becomes a normal thing, the more likely we can connect and create solutions. The secret to talking about climate change is to listen and learn from the other person. When the time is right, share your perspective starting with a story. Here are suggestions for 'talking climate' from Climate Generation and Interfaith Power and Light.

- 1. Ask permission.
  - Hey, can I talk with you about something?
  - Do you have a few minutes right now?
- 2. Ask an open-ended question about climate change.
  - How do you feel about climate change?
  - What's with this weird weather?
  - How has climate change affected your community? Your family?
- 3. Listen, don't interrupt. Ask curious questions.
  - Can you tell me more about that?
  - Compared to your childhood, are today's winters any different?
- 4. Repeat back to them what you hear.
  - This is what I heard you saying...is that right?
  - Like you said...
- 5. Share about changes you have noticed in places you care about. (shifting seasons, disappearing animals or appearing plants, nature)

Thank each other for talking climate!

(Weather refers to short term atmospheric conditions while climate is the weather of a specific region averaged over a long period of time. Climate change refers to long-term changes.)

# **Stepping On Up Update**



The Rental Space Sub-committee continues to work with Stepping On Up, CHUM and Lutheran Social Services. Plans to remodel the former daycare space into housing for 12 young adults experiencing homelessness are moving along.

In funding news, the Minnesota Department of Health and Human Services awarded a \$1 million grant to CHUM for the construction phase of this project. In addition to this money, Joel Kilgour, SOU's Program Director has secured \$215,000 in private donations.

Stepping On Up architects John Erickson and Gabe Zaun, with DSGW, shared their nearly complete final architectural drawings at a January 18<sup>th</sup> meeting. In attendance were representatives from Peace, LSS, CHUM, Donald Holm Construction and A.G. O'Brien Plumbing and Heating.


Work also continues on both a construction and operating lease agreement with pro bono legal assistance from attorneys Dan Maddy and Caitlin Crowl with the Fryberger Law Firm. Peace Church can not thank them enough for their tireless work on these detailed and complicated leases.

Demolition should begin in March with Peace member Danny O'Neil heading up a volunteer crew. Stay tuned for details about a work day and several counters, cupboards and other items used by the former daycare that will need new homes before construction begins.

In neighborhood relations news, Peace was awarded a \$2000 Re-Imagination grant from the MN UCC Conference to be used for future relationship building neighborhood gatherings. Thanks to Pastor Charlotte for bringing this grant to our attention and business manager Rachel Obed's work on the application. Also the City of Duluth Planning Commission granted our Special Use Permit that was later approved by the City Council.

Talks have also begun on a new location for both the children's library and nursery. Ideas can be shared with this committee or Amanda McElray Hunter - the Children, Youth, and Small Group Coordinator.

# A Word for Justice

#### Twin Ports Interfaith Fundraiser for Palestine



Our interfaith community is devastated by the magnitude of violence and destruction in Gaza. We know that people of all backgrounds in the Twin Ports share our concern for the people of Palestine. More than 1.9 million Palestinians have been displaced from their homes, and more than 24,000 killed. We affirm our commitment to a world of peace where all people live free from oppression.

We invite you to join us on February 18<sup>th</sup> for the Twin Ports Interfaith Fundraiser for Palestine. The fundraiser is organized by a coalition of Muslims, Jews, Christians, and other community members to spread awareness and raise money for the Palestinian Red Crescent. The Palestinian Red Crescent is part of the International Red Cross and is one of the few humanitarian organizations currently providing aid in Gaza.

The fundraiser will feature an informational gallery on the conflict, dinner, and a presentation by Mariam El-Khatib. Mariam El-Khatib is a Palestinian-American who was born and raised in Minnesota. She is a Product Manager at LaunchGood and a volunteer member of the Minnesota chapter of American Muslims for Palestine, where she was previously the chapter lead.

Please join us as we turn our hearts to the people of Palestine and call for peace. To attend the dinner -fundraiser featuring Palestinian food, please purchase dinner tickets for \$55 here: bit.ly/interfaith-twin-ports. There is limited capacity for the dinner, so register soon! At 6:00pm we will transition to the sanctuary for the presentation; people are welcome to only attend the presentation. 


