## Book Study on Healing Haunted Histories

Thursdays, January 19, 26 February 2, 9 from 7-8:30pm on Zoom. Facilitator: Gary Boelhower

Healing Haunted Histories by Elaine Enns and Ched Myers explores the oldest injustice on the North American continent, the genocide of Indigenous peoples, and the wounds that have been caused by extermination and removal and forced acculturation. These wounds have been "inextricably woven into the fabric of our personal and political lives." Healing Haunted Histories also argues we can heal the gaping sores still festering in our own time "through the inward and outward journey of decolonization." We will use the book as a map to chart the stories of our own ancestors, the land they lived on, and the traditions and rituals they brought to this new land. We will investigate the intersection of our own stories with the stories of our Indigenous siblings. We will reflect on our own work of decolonization and repair. ## Hello, Bridge Minister

A Bridge Minister will provide leadership as Peace readies itself for a settled pastor. The work of a Bridge Pastor is a little different from that of an Interim Minister. A Bridge Minister does not plan to stay as long and is less likely to initiate as many changes. Our Bridge will likely have primary responsibility for preaching, working with the Coordinating Council, and supervising staff. Much of the congregation's ministry will continue to be carried out by the current staff.






















#### **Interim Time**

#### From the Moderator


