Ethel Ray Nance was born in 1899 in Duluth and is considered one of the foremost Civil Rights and Women's Rights activists in American history. Come to hear Nance's family share the history of an extraordinary woman who served as a police officer, stenographer, member of the Harlem Renaissance, and promoter of antilynching legislation in Duluth. Nance's granddaughter, Karen Felecia Nance, has recently published her grandmother's biography and will be available to sell and sign copies at the forum.

Shawna has spent most of her career in mental health as a counselor or teacher, researching grief with clients and students. With a master's degree in psychology and a PhD in environmental science, her recent research has focused on the intersection of climate change and mental health. Her new book is the culmination of what she's learned about grief, stories from clients and students, and her own vision for a better future through refocusing our climate change anxieties on community-care, compassion, and self-love.

From Rev. Corinne Freedman Ellis

Many of you know I spent some time organizing with ISAIAH, a statewide faith-based organizing collective headquartered in the Twin Cities. Before I was on staff, I was a clergy leader in the organization, and I worked with a spectacular clergy organizer, Grant Stevensen. His background was as a Lutheran pastor, and his philosophy was that every pastor's ministry would be improved if they saw their role as not just spiritual leaders, but also as organizers. The way this manifested was through intentional 1:1 conversations where Stevensen got a sense of what really mattered to people, and out of those conversations, everyone in the congregation was given a job that matched their passions, gifts, and skills with the needs of the community.

At first, this felt transactional to me. Give everyone a job? But Stevensen explained to us that this gave everyone a sense of meaning, belonging, and ownership of the church community. Even the homebound woman who could no longer see well enough to write cards or hear well enough to make calls had a job praying for her fellow homebound members. Our community is enriched by every single person in our web of connections, and we deny people's worth and value if we think, "Oh, I shouldn't ask them to serve the church, they're too busy/sick/disabled/disconnected." It's a very different way of looking at our shared ministry!

April is Shared Ministry Month at Peace Church, and we are filled with gratitude for all the ways you, the members and friends of Peace, share your gifts with this community. The enclosed brochure details much of the work that goes on here, and if you are someone who is seeking greater meaning, belonging, and ownership in the church, you will be invited into those opportunities throughout this month. What the brochure doesn't include is what you might start, if you have a passion or interest that isn't already represented as a ministry opportunity here. We don't do things at Peace just to do them – we do them because they matter to people here and in our wider community.

As we head into this month, I invite you to do some discerning about where you feel called. Perhaps you are overcommitted here and need to step back in one area or another! Maybe you want to step into a space you've never tried before. Or maybe your call is to start something new. Howard Thurman wrote, "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive." Let's enter this Easter season, this season of new life, with a commitment to our own alive-ness. It will transform not just us, not just our community, but our world. Jubilee Fund

As a newer member of the Fund Oversight Committee, I continue to learn about the important ways Peace Church contributes financially to our community. A few months ago I wrote an article about the importance of the PK Fund in the life of Children and Youth Ministries and how we need to continue to secure donations to this fund, to ensure we can equitably fund opportunities for our young people into the future. The PK Fund helps Peace to pay for special trips and activities for youth that contribute to their developing sense of service and faith. These mountaintop experiences can be life changing for our young people: giving them agency in their lives, underscoring the relevance of their faith, and demonstrating the impact their service can have in creating a better world.

Another important fund in the life of Peace that works in concert with the PK Fund is the Jubilee Fund. The Jubilee Fund was established in 2009 as a way to support efforts to build the Beloved Community. With the Jubilee Fund, Peace shows that we are walking our talk!

The mission of the Jubilee Fund is to be a financial resource to enable members and friends of Peace Church to be actively engaged in justice issues that affect the Duluth community and the broader region, nation, and world.

Some priority issues include ending poverty, economic justice, dismantling racism, and eliminating hunger. Each project must have the initial support and engagement of at least 3 Peace Church members and be implemented in cooperation with a group or entity that is outside of Peace Church. Past partners include CHUM, our sister congregations in the Philippines, Witness for Peace, and the Clayton-Jackson-McGhie Memorial Committee. Jubilee Funded Projects have community impact. Funded projects have included the St Mark Giving Garden/Food Access Project, creating a building fund to respond to the needs of members and neighbors for housing repairs, supporting a group of local youth of color to travel to the National Memorial of Peace and Justice in Montgomery, Alabama dedicated to those lynched in this country, and supporting monthly Sobriety Feasts sponsored by the Duluth Indigenous Commission by providing funding for speakers, supplies, and sweat lodge.

Each project sponsored by the Jubilee Fund seeks to educate and engage members of the congregation. This engagement can include Adult Forums, presentations during worship, volunteer opportunities, special events inside or outside of Peace, and newsletter and website articles. Grants are generally anticipated to be in the range of \$500 – \$5,000, though special consideration can be given to requests outside of that range. Grants are awarded throughout the year as applications come in. The application process is straightforward and applications can be accessed through Peace's website.

Based on my job description, I tend to look at a lot of things at Peace from the perspective of our youth and children and this brings me full circle to why the Jubilee Fund is such an important instrument for good, not only in our wider community but also in our own congregation. Peace's commitment to justice and helping our community demonstrates to our young people that the faith we teach them is real, meaningful, and has impact. If the PK Fund helps us to show our young people that they have agency and that their faith is relevant, the Jubilee Fund goes a step further helping our young folks to see us elder folks of Peace Church continue a lifetime commitment to following the ways of Jesus.


Men's Breakfast Every other Thursday, 8:00am

Children, Youth and Families

Hello Families,

Easter has come! We've revisited those long-ago stories that make us witnesses to resurrection and the triumph of love over death, imperialism and colonialism. We've hunted Easter eggs, enjoyed baskets stuffed with goodies, prepared our traditional feasts, and gathered with family and friends to share our common rituals of joy and remembrance.

So ... now what?

From our Bible stories we know that it is after Easter, that the real work of the church begins. Our mission is to continue Jesus' work where he left off – to love and repair a world in need of care and hope and reconciliation, to reestablish good relationship with God, community and ourselves. There's always more work to do!

Even still, even with this meaningful purpose, it's not unusual to feel that moment of after-celebration let down as we return to the everyday.

Perhaps this year we can frame this feeling as a moment to rest, to reset, to note the things that have passed on and the things that will be reborn in a new season of our lives. The Easter season in our liturgical year is not just 1 day, it is the 50 days leading to Pentecost! Pentecost is a Greek word meaning fiftieth, and the time leading to it is, yet again, a time of preparation in the church. Pentecost celebrates the descent of the holy spirit on those followers of Jesus who would create the church. It marks the beginning of the church's mission to the world, shifting the focus of Christian community from the singular focus of the life of Jesus to sharing the love of Jesus' ways with the rest of the world.

In Children's Church on Easter Sunday, we handed out "Joy Journals." The kiddos will use these journals for the 50 days after Easter while we prepare for Pentecost. Each day they can write or draw one person, place, event, or other thing that brought them joy that day. It's a way to reset our year with new intentions and to pay attention to what it is in our lives that brings us sustaining joy. Joy is a way finder, pointing us to those moments when we can live into our mission within the church and create deep meaning from our lives. I invite each of you to engage in this practice of naming your daily joy over the next 50 days of Easter along with our children!

Your love and service make our ministry to our young people vibrant and welcoming!

Stepping On Up Update

Stepping On Up is off and running at our Peace Church location! In December, CHUM secured a grant and additional funds to begin construction of the twelve-unit shelter housing for 18-24 year old homeless youth that will be in our former daycare wing. The lease with CHUM for the construction and a memorandum of understanding with LSS for the staffing and management of the facility were signed in early March.

As soon as they were signed, Danny O'Neill of our congregation organized volunteer demolition crews and the demo began. Volunteers spent a collective of 137 hours working and managed to knock out the demo in five days! Four large dumpsters of debris were removed, and the 5,000 SF space is now completely open and ready to begin construction. Many thanks to all the demolition volunteers, including a crew of Master Rowers from the Rowing Club that did some major work!

A Word for Justice

Ethel Ray Nance Commemoration and Celebration Events

April 11th - 14th, 2024

Ethel Ray Nance was born on April 13th, 1899 in Duluth and graduated from Duluth Central High School in 1917. Ethel Ray is considered one of the most important Civil Rights and Women's Rights icons in America. She was the first African American stenographer to work for the Minnesota Legislature, she became the first African American female police officer on the Minneapolis Police force, followed by an appointment at the Kansas City Urban League. Afterwards, she relocated to the New York Urban League to serve as secretary, researcher, writer and editor for Opportunity Magazine. During the Harlem Renaissance Ethel Ray was friends with prominent scholars and writers such as Zora Neale Hurston, Langston Hughes, W.E.B. DuBois and others. In fact, Ethel Ray became Secretary to DuBois. DuBois was founder of National NAACP. While in Duluth, Ethel Ray and family were members of St. Mark AME church. Ethel Ray convinced DuBois to come to Duluth to talk about anti Lynching legislation.

Several of her family members will be in Duluth April 11th - 24th in celebration of her life. Peace Church is a sponsor for these events through a grant from the Jubilee Fund. Ethel Ray's granddaughter, Karen Felecia Nance, has written a book about her life that will be released on April 13th.

Peace Church is celebrating Earth Day on April 21st in worship and at our Spring Fling festival on May 19th, with garden activities, music and fun. Mark your calendars!

Here is a history of Earth Day from earthday.org:

Prior to Earth Day, air pollution was commonly accepted as the smell of prosperity. However, the stage was set for change with the publication of Rachel Carson's Silent Spring in 1962. The raised public awareness and concern for living organisms, the environment, and the inextricable links between pollution and public health.

Senator Gaylord Nelson, the junior senator from Wisconsin, had long been concerned about the deteriorating environment in the United States. Inspired by the student anti-war movement, Senator Nelson announced the idea for a teach-in on college campuses to the national media. Senator Nelson and his team chose April 22, a weekday falling between Spring Break and Final Exams, to maximize the greatest student participation.

The effort soon broadened to include a wide range of organizations, faith groups, and others. Earth Day 1970 became, and continues to be to this day, the largest secular day of protest in the world. The theme of Earth day 2024 is "Planet vs. Plastics," demanding a 60% reduction of ALL plastics by 2040.


