

I'm your newly elected moderator Jessica Olson, and I am looking forward to serving the congregation in this role for the coming year. My spouse Justin and I live in the Chester Park neighborhood with our teenagers Gus and Heidi, our dog Nigel, and two summertime-resident guinea pigs (Maddy and Chocolate Chip).





- 1) Election of the new coordinating council and gratitude to councilors who stepped down this year.
- 2) Approval of a loan or line of credit for up to \$50,000 for sealing and repairing our flat roof.
- 3) Approval to proceed with developing lease agreements with Stepping on Up partners for the purpose of transforming our former daycare wing into transitional housing for homeless young people.

At our June council meeting, we voted to proceed with patching, sealing and striping our upper parking lot. We also approved new language in the employee handbook related to HSA and IRA benefits, as well as a new Respectful Workplace policy.

The property team reported that an energy audit of the building was scheduled for June 21st. Property team members have been learning about heating and cooling options for our building, including federal and state-level incentives available for churches to transition to geothermal and solar. Stay tuned, or feel free to come to a property team meeting to participate in this process!

This summer is certainly a time of transition for Peace Church. We said a fond farewell to newly ordained Faith Formation minister Nathan Holst, who will be starting a journey as lead pastor at St. John's United Church of Christ on Madeline Island. The HR team has worked with Nathan to develop a job description for a new Children's and Youth Minister, as well as a task list for the next several weeks. We anticipate hiring a temporary part-time employee to assist with some of these tasks until a new permanent position is filled.

Pastor Budd will be leaving Peace Church at the end of July. The council is working on a plan to cover the next bridge period before the arrival of a new settled pastor and will keep the congregation informed about this process. The search committee continues to work hard on behalf of our congregation – often meeting weekly(!) to review resumes, conduct interviews, and evaluate candidates. Please extend a huge thanks to members of that committee when you see them and keep them and the process in your prayers. We look forward to welcoming a new settled pastor when the time comes.

In our continuing journey of change, thank you for encouraging each other along the way. Thanks, too, for your support of the coordinating council. We appreciate your feedback, your prayers, and your willingness to grow together. Good things are ahead.

From the Bridge Minister

On Gratitude



My son and I once traveled to the large Ewe city of Ho in the Volta Region of Ghana. Throughout our visit we were the recipients of a wondrous generosity — all the more awesome when we saw the lack of so many things that

we take for granted. Every evening a different group brought drums, dancing, songs and laughter to share with us. On Sundays we worshipped (again with dance, drums and song) in energetic services that lasted at least four hours each. But we really had come to climb ladders, straddle roof trusses and help construct a fellowship hall. We really had come to lug buckets of sand and cement and to dig (by hand) foundations for a new church building.

During our visit we were befriended by one of the host congregation's leading families. They welcomed us into their home, took us on tours of the community, told us stories and introduced us to many local people. They had one daughter, 13, named "Akpe" (pronounced Ak-Pay). We asked about the meaning of her name.

"When she was born," her father answered, "we just wanted to say 'Thank you.' We were so grateful. So we called her 'Akpe.' That is how we say 'thank you' in Ewe —.Akpe!" "Now," her mother added, "every time we say our daughter's name, we also are saying 'thank you' for this blessing. And every time we say 'thank you' for any kindness done for us, we also think of our daughter."

If each of us could incorporate such gratitude into our everyday lives! We have many reasons to be thankful — and most of them — like Akpe — have faces. Imagine that every person's name secretly means "thank you". Imagine that, when we greet our neighbors or associates, instead of staying "Hi, how are you?" we are really saying, "Thank You". Would that change our view of everything?

Peace UCC and St. Mark's AME celebrate Juneteenth together

A large and enthusiastic gathering from Peace Church and St. Mark's AME came together for our second Annual Juneteenth Celebration at the Hillside Sports Center, sponsored by the NAACP. The Hillside Gospel Choir led us in spirited praise music. Six students received Arthur Foy Scholarships; Anthony Galloway preached, and the



NAACP provided a warm brunch and fellowship.

Foy Scholarship Recipients

The Foy scholarships are a memorial to Pastor Arthur Foy who served St. Mark AME church and the Duluth community in the late 1990's and early 2000's. Pastor Foy believed deeply in the value of education and encouraged young people to pursue higher education. He was killed in an automobile accident in 2004. The memorial scholarships continue his legacy. 2023 Foy Scholars are:

Claire Atella, East High School. She helped build up the youth group at her church. She learned a lot about the value of community when she was given the opportunity to attend the Scott Anderson Leadership Forum. Claire intends to pursue a degree in social work.

Sariyah Crawford, Denfeld High School. She helped create a Mental Wellness Club, and has been a peer educator with Planned Parenthood. Her dream is to become a doctor.

Stella Harbson, East High School. She was a Teen Leader for the Twin Ports Teen Science Café. She has been involved in Sources of Strength an effort to raise mental health awareness. She hopes to someday become a pediatric doctor.

Rachel Hagen, East High School. She is a Youth Leader who works with younger children at her church, sorts clothing donations for the church's free store and helps at the church's food shelf.

Neva Zigich, Denfeld High School. During the pandemic, she took responsibility for many chores at home, excelled in remote learning herself, and oversaw her younger siblings remote learning. She is interested in Exercise Physiology and the broader field of Physical Therapy.

JhaQuinn Smith, Superior Senior High School. He participated in the Upward Bound Program at UWS and volunteered regularly at Great Lakes Elementary School. He hopes to become an elementary or secondary education teacher.

This month we'd like to draw your attention to dates related to our changing climate and to ways you may participate in related local activities.

Lake Superior Day, July 16

You've probably heard a lot in the media lately about Duluth being a 'Climate Refuge' city. We aren't going to go into all the issues involved with that today, but instead we will point out that Duluth's Great Lake, Superior, is <u>not</u> immune to the changing climate's effects. Climate Emergency Day, July 22 On this day the Climate Clock ticks down to below six years for the first time. This means we have less than six years to dramatically reduce fossil fuel emissions to stay below 1.5C degrees warming. People around the world will hold rallies, special events and press conferences. In Duluth, a rally recognizing the climate work that is currently being done, overviews of studies and recommendations for actions will be held at 11:00 a.m. at City Hall. Please join us! July Special Offering One Roof

One Roof, an agency included in Peace's Christian Service budget, provides **HOUSING** avenues to housing for lower income individuals and families. The Community Land Trust program is now part of One Roof. Staff from One Roof provide guidance to prospective renters and home owners and has a tool lending library for do-ityourself projects. Their construction company, Common Ground, rehabs houses for lower income buyers. In partnership with Stepping On Up, One Roof is preparing to break ground for Plover Place, a supportive housing development for persons experiencing homelessness. MN Conference Annual Meeting Report

Nathan Holst and Charlotte Frantz attended the Annual Meeting of the Minnesota Conference June 8th-10th. Nathan provided musical leadership during plenary sessions and worship.

Charlotte attended an Anti-Racism workshop led by Rev. Dr. Jia Starr Brown, a colleague of Pastor Anthony Galloway at Dendros Group. Jia made the distinction between multiculturalism, where cultures exist in proximity to one another and intercultural connections, where cultures are engaged with one another and their various narratives. Changes in communities need to begin with an awareness of the implicit bias that informs each person's world view. Later this year, Dr. Brown and Pastor Anthony will lead a training in Racial Consciousness for Peace members.

The one prophetic resolution brought to the Conference called upon UCC members and congregations as well as the Conference to advocate for full funding of English Language Learner and Special Education services in public education. This resolution will be forwarded for consideration at the 2025 General Synod.

Two congregations joined the Minnesota Conference. United Faith Community in Buffalo is a small congregation that worships in a conference room of a local organization. Ole Olson is their pastor and the congregation is involved in an inspiring amount of advocacy, mission outreach, and public witness in the community. People's Congregational Church in Bayport was also received into Conference membership. Pastored by Rev. Clare Gromoll, People's Congregational will also maintain its membership with the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches.

In her State of the Conference address, the Rev. Shari Prestemon talked about the challenges of the church in a post-Covid time. She identified imagination as vital to the church in this time. "Reimagination is a core strategy for our future," she said, "a tool for noticing & seizing the new thing God is longing to do in this "Age of the Spirit."

There were a number of workshops offered. Charlotte learned about the North Star (Safety, Trust and Respect) Act, a bill that would provide for increased safety for immigrants living in Minnesota. A North Star Alliance includes dozens of faith-based and social justice organizations who see this legislation as an urgent moral imperative. Advocating for this legislation certainly fits with Peace's Immigrant Welcoming Initiative and the Interfaith Committee for Migrant Justice. Watch for more information.


