She also worked for the interfaith organization, ISAIAH, as a congregational organizer. Sunday's worship service, led by Pastor Corinne, is posted on Peace's YouTube channel.

Dear Friends.

The Dove: Symbol of Peace

The dove sculpture on the exterior of our building was first designed in 2010 by Peace member Gail Blum. When she first imagined a fitting image for our



congregation, she imagined a dove, "a fierce and purposeful bird with a strong back bone, maybe even one with some hawk in its DNA." As she worked with the design, she incorporated the risen sun and the cross and decided the dove needed to fly "decidedly left." Gail is a jewelry designer, and the design became, in her mind, a brooch for the new building.

By 2014 the sculpture had begun to show signs of weathering. In spite of repairs, the wooden pieces continued to deteriorate.

Gail redesigned the dove as Peace was preparing to celebrate its 150th anniversary and last week the new sculpture was installed. It continues to express Peace's "commitment to faith, hope an activism."

Stepping On Up Update

A working group of Peace members met regularly through the summer and plans are underway! On September 24th, Jessica Olson, Pam Kramer, Joel Kilgour (representing Stepping On Up) and Dawn Shykes (representing Lutheran Social Service) presented an update to Peace members during the 9:30 Forum. The presentation was recorded and is linked to the Peace website. In summary, attorneys Dan Maddy and Caitlin Crowl have been providing pro bono services to develop the lease on Peace's behalf. CHUM will lease the space and do the necessary renovation; once that is done, LSS will lease the space and provide the programming and supervision. Much of the funding is in place and John Erikson and Gabe Zaun are providing architectural services to CHUM. A community meeting was held for the neighborhood in August and postcards were sent to neighbors to let them know of the proposed plans in September. Additionally, a community education meeting will be held at Peace on November 2nd on the topic of Youth Homelessness. The renovated space will provide supportive shelter for 10-12 young adults ages 18-24. There will not be an indoor access between Peace Church and the shelter. Plans are in place for upgraded security of both the building and parking lot. It is hoped that renovation and rent payments can begin in November or December, depending on grant disbursement timing and other variables.

Luggage on wheels and ordinary backpacks

Clothing: (cotton molds fast and doesn't dry well) hiking boots, sturdy tennis shoes

socks, at least 25% polyester ("hiking" socks) leggings (little or no cotton fibers)

Food, supplements:

Climate Corner

The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA): Helping Home-renters & Homeowners

The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) can have enormous impacts on energy costs, pollution and the climate crisis across the country. Here is the official website about it: https://

The IRA can help weatherize your home. You can get discounts to install electronic appliances; get a tax credit for buying a new or used electric vehicle (EV); receive a tax credit for joining a community solar panel grid or for installing your own solar panels. As a renter, with the help of your landlord, you can get electric upgrades for less. Low-income households can receive full rebates to cover the cost of a heat pump, while moderate-income households can get half-off discount rebates. Home energy efficiency is the biggest way ordinary people can reduce their own carbon pollution. Making a home energy efficient is a multi-step process.



It is best to go left to right, starting with air sealing and insulation.

Weatherization prepares our homes for all types of weather, from snowstorms to heat waves. It will make your home more comfortable, lower your energy bills, and (if done properly) improve your indoor air quality. Weatherization should be completed before you invest in new appliances, windows, or solar panels.

The IRA encourages homeowners and homerenters to switch to electric appliances by offering rebates or tax credits. For example, if you have a gas stove, you can receive a rebate that helps you pay for a cleaner, electric stove. As a renter, you can purchase a countertop stove or induction burner. Depending on your income, this could be entirely covered under the IRA, and you could take the portable induction burner to your next home. Use the Rewiring America IRA-calculator to see how IRA can benefit you.


MN Conference Young Adult Leadership Initiative Retreat
