Call to order at 6:35 p.m.

Opening Meditation: Penny Cragun shares the UCC Daily Devotional from June 4th *Not done yet* by Mary Luti.

Discussion for Consent Agenda items -

- Finance Committee: Dick Goese, Treasurer, adds:
 - The \$50,000 Certificate of Deposit (CD) came due and has been cashed and put into the money market account for possible expense of a new furnace.
 - We may need additional funds for Lighting the Peace Bell Tower.
 - Overall projected income is a bit behind, but so are expenses.
 - We have used \$50,000 of the \$100,000 special pledge given to balance the 2022 budget.
- May 17th Council Minutes correction -

 - Pastor Jim will facilitate the Adult Forum
 - Spelling corrected for Joe Kilgour

- Interim Pastoral Associate Report highlights given orally.
 - Rev. Charlotte Frantz will be out of the office beginning Thursday, June 23rd for hip surgery and will resume work when able.
- Faith Formation Report highlights given orally.
 - Nathan didn't preach last Sunday as stated in his report.

It is moved and seconded to accept the Consent Agenda items as received, given, and corrected. Unanimously approved.

Minister's Report - Reverend Jim Mitulski reports:

- We are continuing Pride Month celebrations.
- Joint worship on Sunday, June 19th with St. Mark A.M.E. was good. The event was well attended by both churches as well as Duluth community members and leadership. An announcement about the October Peace Rally was made. Thank you to Tim Peters who stayed at church to help navigate those who showed up for the regular Peace Church service. More joint events are being planned including a concert on Saturday July 2nd at 6:30 p.m. and in August to commemorate the death of Emmett Till.
- Announcements have been sent to organizations advertising the October David Hogg Rally and we are receiving responses.
- Pastor Jim facilitated the Conflict Resolution modules of Peace Village.
- Beginning July 10th there will be just one Sunday worship service at 9:00 a.m. for the rest of the summer.
- There will be no Wednesday night programming this summer as we are concentrating on fall program planning, as well as giving pastoral staff time off.
- Pastor Jim will be gone from July 1-8.

Discussion of transition-

- Pastor Jim summarizes that as far as transition, everything is taking longer than originally thought.
- The Transition Team will be initiated in July. Transition Team members include: Mike Schrage, Cathy Ameel, Ezra Schomberg, Veronica Gaidelis-Langer, Mary Junnila, Bob Stevens, and Kelly Grgas-Wheeler.
- The Transition Team will begin their work with the HOLY COW assessment tool to congregation members and friends. The assessment consists of 100+ questions with two additional modules of Interim, and Worship and Music. We can add up to five of our

own questions, one of which will be an open-ended question. It takes less than an hour to complete the assessment which will be emailed to all Peace UCC members and friends. Since the assessment can only be done on the computer, we need to figure out how to work with those who do not have computers.. Joan Peterson will write another article explaining HOLY COW in the July Peace Bell. It may require some creative nudging/ recruiting to get the two hundred individual responses desired. The assessment results will be very helpful for putting together the Church Profile, the Stewardship Drive, and for the Council (strategic planning). The Council will look at the data before it goes out to the congregation in the fall. The total cost of the assessment is less than \$2,000. More information can be found on the HOLY COW website

- Work is being done to determine what our church membership actually is, hopefully to be done within the next month.
- We are not yet at a point to consider the appointment of a search committee for a settled pastor.

Old Business-

Aurora Borealis DayCare Update - Tom Hystead

- A lease with the new Aurora Borealis DayCare owners Stephanie and Jeff Boness has been signed. The owners live out of town and there is an on-site manager. Rent has been paid.
- A bill for legal fees (\$2,400) has been received for writing up the new lease.
- The new owners seem to have a good and long term plan for serving the families and children of our community.
- They realize a need to upgrade some of the playground equipment and classroom furniture.
- Joan Peterson and Susan Larson Kidd volunteer to meet with the owners quarterly to check in, build relationship, and be a liaison for the church.

Fund oversight committee- Tom Hystead

- A Fund Oversight Committee for the Jubilee and Primarily Kids (PK) Funds has been created. It will consist of several Council members, two members from Acting for Justice, and a staff member connected to family/kids. Betty Greene agrees to facilitate the group of Diane Swanoski, Melissa Boyle, Penny Cragun, Monica Liddle, and Nathan Holst. The Stewardship Team will be educating the congregation about these funds. Dick Goese will forward the fund guidelines to Geof Witrak.

Clergy Care grants- Tom Hystead

- The UCC Conference put out an opportunity to apply for grants to recognize our clergy for outstanding work. We applied for and were awarded the \$1,000 grant enabling us to give monetary gifts to our three clergy and gift cards to our clergy practicing outside of the church, for their outstanding work.

New Business-

Task force for Pastor Jim's contract extension -

- A task force made up of Jessica Olson, Susan Larson Kidd, Melissa Boyle, and Tom Hystead will work on the extension of Pastor Jim's contract with the Church. They will meet in August.

Tech team Update - Susan Larson Kidd

- Susan Larson Kidd distributes a list of the Tech Coordinator Responsibilities she currently does (Attachment #6). There is also a copyright piece that is not currently being addressed.
- The Tech Coordinator reports to the pastor as part of worship and arts.
- We need to consider making this a sustainable and paid position in the future since technology is now an important part of our worship and will be going forward. We need to reach our audience in new ways, including an online presence and via social media.
- The Council will talk more about technology and staffing at our retreat.

150th Anniversary Committee funding request -

- Marsha Hystead, chair of the 150th Anniversary Committee, requests \$12,500 funds for David Hogg's speaking fee for the fall Rally - \$5,000 from the Jubilee Fund and \$7,500 from the PK Fund (Attachment #7).
- The Primarily Kids (PK) and Jubilee Funds are the responsibility of the Council. Dick Goes moves that we approve \$5,000 from the Jubilee Fund and \$7,500 from the PK Fund to pay David Hogg's speaking fee. Geof Witrak seconds the motion and it passes unanimously.
- The airfare for David Hogg has been donated by a friend of the Hysteads.
- The Ordean Fund has granted Peace UCC \$2,000 for the event.,

Principles for conducting meetings-

- Drafting a document of principles for conducting meetings has been tabled, possibly an agenda item the Council retreat or for a task force to consider.

Sponsorship of Boy Scout Troop - Tom Hystead

- Peace UCC has been asked to sponsor a Boy Scout Troop that is currently sponsored by and meets at Trinity Lutheran Church.
- Tom Hystead, Joan Peterson, and Nathan Holst will meet with Clark Garthwait, District Director BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA Voyageurs Area Council , for clarification of sponsorship and the responsibilities involved.
- Pastor Jim will check in with the UCC Conference about sponsoring a troop. We must understand what we are committing to and figure out how to structure it.
- Questions to consider before sponsoring the troop - What does sponsoring a troop involve? Is there liability for Peace? Does this align with our mission? What are the ways we want to involve and retain youth at Peace?

Adult Education/Faith Formation Team

Adult forums are scheduled through the end of June. June 5th there was no forum since a breakfast for the high school graduates and their families was held in the Fellowship Hall. On June 12th Pastor Jim led a session on “What’s Next in This Interim Process” and on June 26th Pastor Jin will facilitate a discussion on the history and significance of the Stonewall uprising.

The team has begun planning for the fall. Since Pride is celebrated on Labor Day week-end in the Twin Ports and Peace will be hosting the breakfast on that Sunday, adult forums in September will focus on better understanding sexuality/identity. One topic that is especially important is transgender youth and how to support them and their families.

The team is also exploring how to relate to the David Hogg vent on October 1st. We plan to coordinate our offerings with other teams that are working on this event. One proposal is to facilitate adult conversation with youth around this issue. We think it is important to explore what we as Peace folks are doing and will do politically and strategically. We might be able to put together a “how to” around intergenerational organizing around work to end gun violence. Another proposal is to sponsor an all church read and possibly an all city read of David Hogg’s book.

A successful Peace Village Day Camp was held June 13-17 with the support of the pastoral staff and volunteers.

Interim Pastoral Associate Report

June 21, 2022

I'm never quite sure what Council members want to know from staff reports. Should any of you have specific requests about what is included, please let me know.

In the past month, in addition to my usual participation in creating and leading worship, staff meetings, and various team meetings, I co-facilitated the Conflict Resolution class that was part of Peace Village.

I also took the Power and Boundary Training required to keep my standing as a UCC minister in the United Church of Christ and attended the Minnesota Conference meeting. In one of the Conference workshops I learned that the UCC no longer uses the category of "retired ministers." Instead, when one is no longer employed in a ministerial position, the choice becomes to be an "exempt clergy" meaning available to help out in the congregation where one is a member or to

be listed as “available for occasional service.” “Occasional service” can be consultative work, pulpit supply, bridge pastoring at the end or beginning of an interim period, or other ministry.

I presented a workshop at the Conference meeting that focused on Peace’s experience with the Afghan Resettlement Sponsorship Circle program.

The Conference itself was informative and structured in ways that gave delegates opportunities to re-connect. The keynote speaker, Diane Butler Bass, re-affirmed that post-covid church will not be a return to pre-covid times. We are in an era of re-imagining what “church” will be.

I continue to work with the Homeless Response Team. Plans are underway for Stepping on Up to open Safe Bay in early July. Safe Bay will provide space on the Damiano parking lot for people who are living in their vehicles. Volunteer orientations will take place next week—volunteers are needed 7:30-10 in the evenings and 7:00-8:30 in the mornings.

Good Neighbor volunteers will soon be trained to assist with opening an Authorized Outdoor Living space later this summer. The first space is likely to be on the East Hillside.

Additionally, Stepping on Up will host a series of training sessions to help community members feel more confident and able to relate to persons who experience homelessness. Peace Church members will have the opportunity to participate in these sessions.

The Peace Church Duluth Welcome Circle (the official title of our current immigrant welcoming initiative) had an interesting month when three of the women from Afghanistan planned to relocate. One of them left Duluth yesterday to live with a close cousin in Silver Spring, Maryland. The other three decided, just before a planned departure, to stay here in Duluth. The Circle is now working to help them re-apply for benefits, find and follow career paths, and explore higher education possibilities.

I am scheduled for hip replacement surgery on Thursday, June 23 and expect to be at home recuperating for at least 2 weeks following. I plan to work remotely as I am able and will return to in person presence as my mobility allows.

Thank you very much for the clergy care gift made possible by the grant from the Minnesota Conference.

As always, I appreciate your work for and with Peace Church, and I look forward to the new Council as we all learn to work together and envision what Peace is becoming.

Faith Formation Minister Report for June 2022 Nathan Holst

Events/small groups

- We had a wonderful graduation Sunday for our seniors, which included blessings, blankets, speakers, and music. I also led a service to bless and dedicate the bench for Nat Hawley.
- We had a fantastic Peace Village day camp for our kids this last week, partnering with UUCD for this first attempt. Katie (from UUCD) and I led the opening/closing and made sure everything ran smoothly. We had a great group of teachers/leaders (thanks to Mary Adams and Diane Swanoski on council for helping teach) and a lively group of 14 middle and high school youth as counselors for each group of kids. There were about 35 kids that came and they had a fantastic time. We will be gathering the teachers again to get feedback, but we are excited to make this an annual occurrence to help teach peace to our kids.
- I am preparing for our Pine Ridge trip coming up the last week of July.

Worship

- I meet with Pastor Jim, music Jim, and Charlotte each week to plan the services
- I continue to lead story for all ages on Sunday morning.
- I continue to provide music for the service as needed.
- Charlotte, Jim, and I have been rotating roles on Sunday mornings in leading the worship
- I preached this last Sunday

Youth

- In addition to organizing the youth to help with Peace Village, I held a bowling night at the incline station this last week. We had 16 youth and we had a great time! I've got a volunteering opportunity for them this weekend with the Rhubarb Festival and next month we will go roller skating together. Should be fun!
- At the end of Peace Village, I spent about an hour with the youth reflecting on what they loved, what was challenging, what they learned about leadership, and what they would change about the day camp. This kind of leadership development is one of my favorite things to do and it's wonderful to witness the kind of learning and growth that comes out of leading kids for a week. My primary role is to ask good questions and get them talking. Once they got going, they couldn't stop talking about all they experienced.
- At the Conference annual meeting recently, I went to a rally with March for our Lives as a way to help me think about engaging our youth around organizing leading up to (and following up) our speaker on Oct. 1st, David Hogg. I have started communicating with the 150th anniversary group to make sure we are all coordinating our efforts, but I am excited to see what might come of connecting with our youth and getting them more engaged around organizing and strategy.

Children

- After finishing Peace Village day camp, we are taking a break from most of our kids programming in the summer. I hope to promote "Peace does Duluth" with our families and see if we can get some of our little ones out to parks and movies this summer together. I'll also bring back Children's Church in July and August as a way of staying connected over the summer.

OWL

- We are on summer break with OWL.

-I have recruited 2 folks to go to a training with me this August to get trained in the adult curriculum, including young adult, adult, and older adult. I hope to get a 12 session course going and invite college students from UMD and St Scholastica as a way of reaching out to young adults, hopefully increasing our numbers connected to our church.

Adults

-All my work around leadership with adults is included in your other reports (Faith Formation Team, Adult Ed, Worship and Arts, etc.)

Administrative/Other

-I continue my work with the Gabriel fund, which seems more manageable now, but we are still working on a good way to focus our energy and balance the work with other tasks included in my job.

-I continue to write birthday cards for youth and children.

-Continuing to meet with staff on a weekly basis.

-I'm excited to share that I was accepted as 1 of 16 young ministers around the country for the UCC Pension Board sponsored NGLI (next generation leadership initiative) program. I asked for your support in February in applying for this program, and I am grateful that your support brought me to this place. I can share more details at the council meeting, but the short version is that it is a 5 year continuing education program that will build my ministerial skills and networks. I'll have some assessment tools that I'll need help from some of our church leadership in filling out soon. The orientation will begin in person in Memphis from Sept. 26-30.

-Some of you have asked about where things are at with my ordination process and I wanted to share that here briefly. Now that I'm done with my CPE program, I have one final class I'm taking this summer and that seems like it will be the final stretch in the process. I will finish my final ordination paper this summer and then meet with the committee on ministry in early fall. If they determine I have fulfilled their expectations of being ready for ordination, I will first have an ordination panel (where I will be asked all kinds of questions to determine more fully my readiness for ordination). If they approve me to go forward, I would then have an ecclesial council, which is a gathering of clergy and lay leaders. I would present my ordination paper, answer any questions anyone had, and then there is a vote to determine readiness for ordination. If that all goes through, then I would be ready to be ordained "pending call", meaning I could be ordained if a church called me in that role as an ordained pastor, whether that is here at Peace Church or in another location.

Background:

In Honor of Peace United Church of Christ's 150th Anniversary, we would like to offer a community-wide event as a gift to Duluth and surrounding communities with the purpose of promoting a peaceful, nonviolent world, encouraging voter registration and engagement in our democracy, with a particular emphasis on engaging youth.

We believe this is a way of respecting and honoring and fulfilling the mission of Peace Church, which is "To be an accessible, open and affirming community growing in Christian faith, committed to peace and justice, and reaching out in healing love to all of creation, including all people, respecting and valuing the diversity of people's sexual orientation, race, culture, gender, age, opinions, and physical and mental abilities".

Background on our featured speaker:

One of the survivors from the Parkland, Florida high school mass shooting in 2018, David Hogg, was thrust into the world of activism by one of the largest school shooting in American history. With the recent heart-wrenching tragedy at Robb Elementary School in Texas, Parkland is now the second largest school shooting.

David Hogg has become one of the most compelling voices of his generation. His call to "get over politics and get something done" challenges Americans to stand up, speak out and work to elect morally-just leaders, regardless of party affiliation. Passionate in his advocacy to end gun

violence, David's mission of increasing voter participation, civic engagement and activism embraces a range of issues.

Hogg is the co-founder of the March For Our Lives, the third largest demonstration in American history, and a significant part of the inspiring wave of youth-led protests. Hogg and his other co-founders were responsible for registering over 800,000 new voters during the movement.

Additionally, he is the co-author of “#NeverAgain: A New Generation Draws the Line” and is currently a student at Harvard University. Here is a link to learn more about David:

Details of The Rally for Peace Event:

We are calling the event “The Rally for Peace.” It will take place on Saturday, October 1st, at Leif Erickson Park. We are hoping to bring people of all ages together, but most importantly, young people who have been through so much the past three years and whose futures are uncertain with the rise of gun violence and continued school shootings. Additionally, the climate crisis, voter suppression laws around the country, new discriminatory laws facing the LGBTQ+ community, increased demonstrative racism and so many other issues, make it more important than ever to reengage our youth to become involved, register to vote and to create the world they want to live in. We have asked David to share his speech “Engage in the Change: Our Generation Must Own Democracy.”

This Rally for Peace will feature speakers from local high schools and universities, as well as, Mayor Emily Larson, the League of Women Voters, and others. The ultimate goal is to inspire youth of all sexual orientation, race, culture, gender, age, opinions, and physical and mental abilities to engage in their community.

Our vision is a community that comes together and joins Peace UCC in our efforts of ending gun violence in our country, starting with Duluth and surrounding areas.

We are happy to share that the excitement for this event is starting to swell. We are inviting other churches in Duluth to join us in our efforts by asking them to become financial partners, and spread the word throughout their congregations, which will show a camaraderie of peace as well. We have also received a \$2000 grant from the Ordean Foundation, which will be used to cover 150th Anniversary expenses, specifically to ensure outreach to our BIPOC audiences. Assuring the safety of David Hogg is critical and so we are working with the City of Duluth, the

Duluth Police and other necessary groups. This will add to the cost of his visit, but is an understandable prerequisite for him to come. Additionally, we will need to cover David and his companion's expenses which will include airfare, hotel, travel, and food. Part of David's agreement includes him speaking and sharing his message at Peace UCC on October 2nd which will round out an incredible weekend.

Relationship to Peace Church's Mission and Vision:

The purpose and vision statements below are for both Peace UCC's Jubilee Fund and the PK Fund. The 150th Anniversary Celebration Committee believes that both of these funds correlate with outcomes the Committee are looking to achieve; i.e., a community-wide event with a high level of youth engagement and involvement focusing on justice issues that affect all of us, but are especially critical for the youth and children who will experience the effects of either a just world or an unjust world for the rest of their lives. The hope is a just and peaceful world.
